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2017 was a challenging, soul searching year for the Winkler Police Board. We spent the better part of the year searching for new senior leadership. We had our both our Sergeant and Inspector retire within weeks of each other. Then Chief Hiebert let us know of his intention to retire in March 2018. We appreciated his courtesy in giving us lots of notice and an opportunity to develop a succession plan. Initially we were confident that we had plenty of time to plan a smooth transition. We couldn't have been more wrong. We head hunted a couple of candidates but were not able to come to terms on a contract with either one. We advertised twice and still were not able to attract qualified outside candidates. We were pleasantly surprised to have two career Winkler police service members apply for the position. Both members have provided exemplary service to our community for many years. With the City of Winkler's support of our request for additional funding for aggressive leadership development, we confidently promoted Ryan Hunt to deputy chief with the intention that he would succeed Rick Hiebert when he retired.

As part of our chief succession planning, we retained Devon Clunis to organizationally and structurally review our service. He delivered a very complementary report that also highlighted a few opportunities for modernization. The board authorized Chief Hiebert to work towards some of those recommendations immediately.

**5. Police Chief Report**

During the month of October officers participated in an MPI sponsored Distracted Driving Campaign resulting in 24 cellphone tickets being issued. On November 1<sup>st</sup> the penalties for operating a vehicle while using a cellphone increased significantly, including a \$672 fine and licence suspension. It is the hope that the increased fine and suspension will help drivers get the message about driving while using a cellphone and hopefully officers will not have to suspend licenses.

While there were quieter days over the past two months, there have also been several major files that required large amounts of work. One of these files was the recent break, enter and theft of firearms from a local outdoor retailer. Officers have been working extremely hard following leads, gathering video surveillance and taking statements, all while responding to other calls for service. Chief Ryan Hunt is extremely impressed with the effort being put into this file.

Members recently attended a presentation in Morden regarding the new cannabis legislation which was given by an RCMP member who assisted with the legislation planning. Off-duty members were approved to receive overtime wages for attending the presentation, as it was important for all members to hear the same message.

The service recently received the Dräger DrugTest 5000 which is a screening tool approved for use in Canada that detects the presence of THC in a driver's saliva. Arrangements are being made to have members trained in the use of the instrument, with the intent of putting the device into use early next year. The city purchased the device for just under \$6000 and is awaiting reimbursement from the federal government.

The recent legalization of cannabis has not had a significant impact on police operations; a few tickets have been issued for cannabis found inside vehicles. Finding cannabis inside a vehicle is not a new occurrence for police, however prior to legalization the cannabis would have most likely been relinquished with no further penalty. Now individuals receive a \$672 fine for carrying cannabis inside a vehicle.

Ryan recently attended an informative meth presentation put on by the Winnipeg Police Service for parents at a Winnipeg high school. The Winkler Police Service is working on putting together a similar presentation, and Winnipeg's police chief and one of its inspectors have offered their assistance to Ryan in preparing the presentation if needed.

P/Sgt. Earl Klassen is currently in Chilliwack attending the Major Crime Investigative Techniques Course (MCITC) offered through the Canadian Police College (CPC), and the remaining patrol sergeants will attend this course next year.

It was asked if meth is a problem in our community, to which Ryan responded that it is a problem. Officers are working hard at cultivating relationships with confidential informants in order to receive tips and intelligence. Ryan compared staying on top of the meth problem to whack-a-mole, meaning you stop one dealer and then another pops up. Staying on top of this problem needs to be a focus of the police service otherwise we lose the whack-a-mole game and everything falls apart. It was clarified that we are not always dealing with the same people; one seller may be dealt with and then someone new arises. The only way to obtain this information is through confidential informants, who are compensated when their information leads to an arrest. Winkler's smaller size is also beneficial as officers are familiar with most culprits in the area.

## **6. Leadership Training**

All patrol sergeants will be attending the MCITC through the CPC. P/Sgt. Earl Klassen is currently taking the course in Chilliwack, while the other patrol sergeants will attend throughout 2019. MCITC teaches officers how to handle and organize serious crime files, and ensure that all duties and tasks are completed as necessary. No members of the service have taken this course in this past.

Ryan and Deputy Chief Chris Kalansky continue to work on their online courses through Dalhousie University, and will also enroll in the Critical Incident Command



Course in 2019, which is offered through the CPC. Administrative training fit into the budget without having to sacrifice any other forms of training.

Training ammunition will need to be purchased in 2019 at a price of approximately \$10,000. The high price tag is not a result of the quantity of ammunition being purchased but rather that the ammunition itself is quite expensive.

Leadership Training will remain on future agendas, as the board is very concerned that the service is well trained, including upper management, middle management and members. 80% of policing is reacting to situations, therefore having well-trained officers who know how to react is key.

#### **7. 2019 Priorities**

The two key priorities for the service in 2019 are dealing with the community's drug problem and training. A large part of the strategic planning process will be determining how to create a measureable yard stick against the drug issue. Our community does not often see the effects of drugs, but there are individuals who are struggling and community service groups that support these individuals. It was also mentioned that drug use is a symptom of a larger problem, whether that be unaffordable housing or food costs, or individuals struggling with mental health issues who do not have proper support. 80% of people may consider using drugs if they are not thinking clearly and the opportunity presents itself, therefore limiting opportunities and desperation when people consider drug use would have a significant impact.

The board would also like to continue making members' training a priority by ensuring members receive training relative to the service's needs.

#### **8. Shared Services Update**

The City of Morden has a brand new council and mayor, and the City of Winkler has one new councilor. Henry Siemens will reach out to Morden Police Board Chairman Rich Harries, as well as request a meeting with the Winkler and Morden mayors in order to receive direction and to see if there is still an appetite for amalgamation. Presumptively it is still full steam ahead, but providing policing to communities is the councils' authority and the council needs to inform the boards of their wishes.

#### **9. Cannabis Preparedness**

Cannabis preparedness has turned into the realities of cannabis. The recent cannabis legislation has not had an impact on policing in Winkler as Ryan had predicted. Before legislation the most common occurrences involving cannabis would be during traffic stops when cannabis could be seen or smelled inside a vehicle. Even after legislation it is still illegal to carry cannabis in a vehicle; it must be stored in the trunk or as far from the driver as possible when a vehicle is not equipped with a trunk. Two tickets carrying \$672 fines were recently issued for carrying cannabis inside a vehicle, whereas before legislation the cannabis would have most likely been relinquished with a warning. Even if an individual would have been charged there would typically only be minor consequences, if any. Cannabis cannot be used in any public parks, essentially the only place it can legally be used is at a residence.



## 10. 2019 Capital Items

The General Operating Fund for the service as of October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2018 was distributed along with the Proposed 2019 Budget. Items marked in yellow are proposed changes.

Overall the service is under budget as of the end of October. Ryan estimates that the budget will be fairly close by the end of December, while a few items are already over budget.

- 911 Service – Over budget, cost more than anticipated.
- Travel & Expense – Budget is almost entirely used.
- Training – Full budget will be used by end of December.
- Guard Duty – Still room left in budget.
- Uniforms – Over budget, all uniform items for a new member came out of this budget.
- Miscellaneous & Rewards – Over budget due to an investigation involving a cellphone which needed to be sent away to be unlocked. This process cost approximately \$4000. Ryan pointed out that in the future unlocking cellphones will likely become a more frequent issue.
- Vehicles – Close to budget.
- Fuel – The price of fuel was high for a period of time, has now dropped but the effects of the upcoming carbon tax must be kept in mind.

It was requested that the budget to be submitted with the agenda to board members prior to the meeting so any questions regarding budget can be prepared in advance.

Ryan was disappointed with the 0% budget increase for 2019 but will make it work by reallocating funds from different budgets. In 2018 a large number of items were purchased using the Special Equipment budget, but that cost has significantly decreased for 2019, leaving funds that can be moved to other areas such as Office Supplies, Fuel, Training and Uniforms, which may otherwise go over budget.

Police Cruiser 706 (administrative vehicle) would have typically been sold back to the dealership for \$500 - \$1000 after it was replaced, however Ryan would like to keep the vehicle in use for administrative and training purposes. The board asked that Ryan keep track of the vehicle's mileage to compare the benefits of keeping the vehicle versus members using their own personal vehicles and being reimbursed.

The Wages & Benefits portion of the Proposed 2019 Budget can be disregarded as David Martens is taking care of the budget in regards to employee wages.

Steven Sukkau asked when the cannabis screening device would arrive and was advised it arrived on December 3<sup>rd</sup> however training for the device still needs to be arranged.

Steven also asked for an update on the dispatch service and was advised that it has been a huge benefit as members no longer have to answer the phone while already dealing with another matter, which was a major safety concern.

**5. Police Chief Report**

Chief Ryan Hunt advised that there have been several changes over the past few months, including Brad Goertzen's promotion to Patrol Sergeant which filled the vacancy left by Ryan. Ryan has been extremely satisfied with the patrol sergeants, all of whom have stepped up and taken a leadership role. The patrol sergeants typically begin their shift with a briefing to their platoon which provides immeasurable value in terms of contributing to strong morale and team building between members.

The three new members recently completed their field training and did a fantastic job. They are all professional, confident and a great fit to the Service. Ryan also commended the field trainers who did an excellent job training the new members.

Deputy Chief Chris Kalansky began his new position on April 1st and has already begun working on Policy & Procedure as well as training requests.

Chris' promotion left a vacancy for constable which was filled by Max Tschuschba, who worked his first shift on April 6<sup>th</sup>. Ryan stated that Max was a very impressive



candidate and the Winkler Police Service is thankful that he accepted the offer of employment.

Ryan pointed out that in the Quarterly Stats there are two counts of Indecently Interfere with Dead Body. Ryan clarified that these incidents did not occur in or near the City of Winkler but were reported to a Winkler member and are therefore present in the Winkler Police Service stats.

**6. Add Municipal Police Board Policy in Manitoba as Addendum to Policies and Procedures Manual**

**8. Leadership Training Plan**

Additional funding for training was requested and approved by the City of Winkler. This provides money which will go towards training Ryan, Chris, and the patrol sergeants in their new duties. Ryan and Chris will also put together a training plan to outline the details and costs of this training. The priority is to have well-trained staff capable of handling any future incidents.

**9. 2018 Priority Discussion**

The priority during the last few years has been focused on responding rather than growing. Last year was a tough year and the Service was thrown for a loop regarding the retirement of the sergeant, inspector and announcement of the police chief's retirement. The Board wishes to ensure this does not happen again by having members trained and ready to step forward. Henry stated it was a blessing to have Ryan and Chris promoted from within, as they both possess great strength of character. This also provides genuine promotion opportunities for other members. Cognizant and continued thought on succession is the single biggest priority, made possible by a strong training plan.

The Board's priority for itself is focusing on updating its Policies & Procedures by personalizing them to the Winkler Police Board instead of the province.

Regionalization conversations have also been taking place with the Winkler and Morden mayors and Board chairs. The conversations have been positive, and the intent is to move towards a merge as long as it makes sense for the communities and police members. The discussion is now focused on determining what road blocks are present and how to move past them.

**10. Staffing Update**

Henry was excited to announce that the Winkler Police Service hired a new member, Max Tschuschba. Henry stated Max is a personable young man and a good fit for the service. Max was previously an officer with the Rivers Police Service, Dakota Ojibway Police Service and is fluent in German and Russian.

Henry also mentioned that it is a good feeling to be fully staffed and not have any vacant positions that need to be filled as compared to last year.

#### **11. Shared Services Update**

Conversation continues around shared services however it is difficult to expand past that. The priority of sharing services is not to save money but to make policing both communities better, providing more advancement opportunities for members and continuing to serve and improve quality of life. The conversations have been positive and Ryan has actively been participating in these discussions. The Board wants to work through all possibilities carefully and address all issues that need to be addressed. Henry was also impressed and thankful to see the Winkler and Morden Police Services thanking each other for assistance in many situations.

Currently the next step will be decided by the CAOs and chiefs by determining what stumbling blocks may lie ahead and working on how they can be removed. Ryan and Brad Neduzak are meeting next week, and tentatively another meeting could take place in approximately one month. The Board will not be present at the next meeting but will provide its recommendations to the two city councils who have the final say.

Shirley pointed out that the Board cannot answer all questions that may arise but is focusing on the main issues that need to be answered. The process seems daunting but that is normal. The little questions will be answered by the chief on an operational level once/if shared services begin. Henry also reminded everyone that due to governance issues the board is not involved in the day-to-day details of the Winkler Police Service.

#### **12. Community Care Initiative**

The Community Care Initiative originally began with policing but is now being run by Lori Penner of Central Station. Although not a board responsibility, the Board wants to remain actively involved and be aware of ways to support the program. The goal is to provide a safety net for people who seem to be falling through the cracks by herding together different social services. Ryan has attended two meetings with a client of the program who was given tasks to complete by the next meeting, which seemed insurmountable at the time. Ryan was impressed to see that with help from many different resources and services the client was able to complete all the required tasks.

The Community Care Initiative is not a police matter but if these types of resources are not available situations can quickly become a police matter. The program is proactive and helps to prevent crimes of desperation and hopelessness.

#### **13. Questions – Media/Public**

Shirley suggested to Steven Sukkau that it would be beneficial for the media to write a Question & Answer article featuring Ryan and Chris to help the community better get to know who its new leadership is.

**5. Police Chief Report**

It was an average summer in terms of workload, with a slight increase from the previous year. The newest member of the Winkler Police Service, PSD Juno, was picked up from Minneapolis in August, and whenever her handler, Cst. Sean O'Brien, is on duty, Juno is on duty as well. Cst. O'Brien has begun training Juno, and her official training begins in the spring of 2019 at the Winnipeg Police Service. It is expected that Juno will train very well.

During the month of September members participated in an MPI funded School Zone Safety Campaign, where extra shifts were worked to increase police presence in school zones. A total of 34 tickets were issued as a result of the campaign, 32 of which were for speeding in a school zone.

A new form of Use of Force training took place this fall, focusing on high-risk vehicle takedowns and scenario based training located at the Winkler Fire Department training grounds.

Chief Ryan Hunt and Deputy Chief Chris Kalansky received a request through the Manitoba Association of Chiefs of Police to assist with a Special Olympics fundraiser on September 22. Ryan and Chris assisted in directing traffic for a convoy of 200 semis driving around the perimeter of Winnipeg. Several different police agencies participated in the fundraiser, and Ryan used this opportunity to connect with these agencies. Winkler members were not involved in traffic control during the Big Rigs, Big Hearts fundraiser, as there are not enough members to direct traffic on that scale.

Ryan expressed how proud he was of the police service and its members, and in viewing the members through the eyes of Chief of Police, he sees how hard they work and how knowledgeable they are in their duties.

It was also noted that officers did an amazing job during Harvest for Kids. Members were well organized and visibly involved in helping to direct traffic.

#### **6. Leadership Training**

Ryan and Chris are currently working on courses offered through Dalhousie University. Ryan is taking a course on budget management while Chris is taking a course focusing on human resources. Ryan and Chris will also be attending the Critical Incident Commanders course at the Canadian Police College (CPC) in 2019. Ryan or Chris would be designated as Incident Commander in critical incidents such as hostage taking.

There were many attempts to enroll the four patrol sergeants in several courses through the CPC, however after experiencing many course cancellations this training could not be completed. The patrol sergeants have now applied for the Major Crime Investigative Techniques Course for 2019.

#### **7. 2018 Priority Review**

A discussion surrounding strategic planning involving Andrew Minor was originally scheduled for the in camera portion of this meeting, however Andrew Minor was unable to attend. The board will reach out to Andrew Minor again and attempt to have a casual conversation with him. A board member may also help Andrew Minor lead the strategic planning process and ensure there is an appropriate leadership training budget. While the board does not want to be frivolous, it is important to use this budget for courses relative to the needs of the service. In 2019, the board's objective is to decide where they would like Ryan to focus his efforts.

#### **8. Shared Services Update**

Although there have been no shared services meetings for the last six months, this item remains on the agenda. The upcoming elections have derailed and logistically stalled conversations. The board wants to ensure it is constantly communicating with members so they are not left out of the loop. Henry Siemens and Rich Harries will send an amalgamation update email to both chiefs to forward to their members.

#### **9. Cannabis Preparedness**

The board feels that Ryan and the service have done a good job preparing for something that is entirely unknown. The service currently has four trained SFST members; this training does not expire, and refresher courses are available. There



are three free courses available to all members online through the Canadian Police Knowledge Network (CPKN) regarding SFST refreshers, the new cannabis legislation, and impaired driving detection techniques. On November 14, a member of the RCMP will attend the Morden Police Service to discuss provincial legislation, and all members of the Winkler and Altona Police Service were invited to attend as well.

No vendors in Manitoba will be ready to sell cannabis out of the gate; there are three approved vendors in Winnipeg, but nobody is ready to begin selling at this point. Within three years, the government's goal is to ensure that 80% of the population has access to cannabis within a 15 minute drive.

For individuals only concerned with the price of cannabis, it is predicted they will continue to buy it on the street as the price is currently \$10/gram, whereas legal cannabis could sell throughout the province for \$12/gram - \$15/gram. Residents of Manitoba are not permitted to grow their own cannabis plants, while other provinces like Ontario are allowed two plants per household. Until vendors are ready to sell, it will be difficult to purchase cannabis through legal suppliers.

The federal government has approved a saliva screening device which reads the level of THC. This will help determine which charges are warranted and what level of charge should be laid. Winkler has been approved to purchase one screening device, and will be reimbursed by the federal government. It is unknown at this time how long it will take to receive the screening device.

Questions arose over what authority or training Winkler's CSO, Kenton Hoeppe, will receive. The Justice Minister released an article regarding changing the CSO's authority and ability to enforce cannabis laws. At this time Kenton is able to enforce Winkler's by-laws, which have cannabis added into the smoking by-law. Ryan and City Manager Barb Dyck would like to plan a conference call with Owen Fergusson from Manitoba Justice to obtain further information.

There are many unknowns ahead, however the board is thankful for a fully staffed compliment of officers, many of whom are veterans. Many details are still unknown but Ryan is confident that things will not drastically change.

#### **10. 2019 Capital Items**

Capital items requested for 2019 consist of:

- 4 sets of Body Armor = \$8,180.00 – Expire in 2019, must be replaced
- 4 Tasers = \$6,980.00 – Expire in 2019, must be replaced
- Patrol Carbine for 705 = \$4,242.00 – Only patrol vehicle without carbine
- Cargo Unit for 704 = \$3,900.00 – Help to stay organized, without the cargo unit there is the possibility of damaging the hard body armor
- Scene Lights = \$2,057.00 – Used for lighting scenes for photographs
- K9 Bite Suit = \$1,600.00 – May be able to purchase used suit from the Morden Police Service. Ryan will do more research into that option.

There was also discussion surrounding what happens to expired equipment. Ryan stated that the equipment is stored and typically destroyed at a later date. It was



recommended that expired equipment could possibly be donated or sold to agencies in other countries that do not have access to proper equipment, as long as the Winkler Police Service could not be held liable for any malfunction of the equipment.

It was recommended to start a reserve fund, as a replacement vehicle will be needed in the year 2020 and again in 2022. Currently only \$25,000 is set aside per year, but one vehicle alone costs \$66,000.
